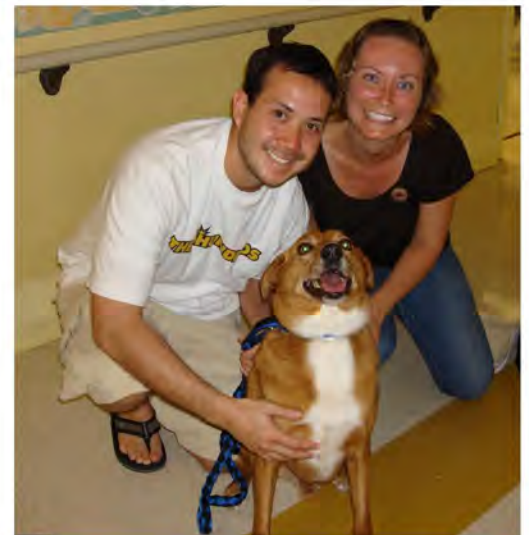
CHANGING LIVES, ONE VISIT AT A TIME

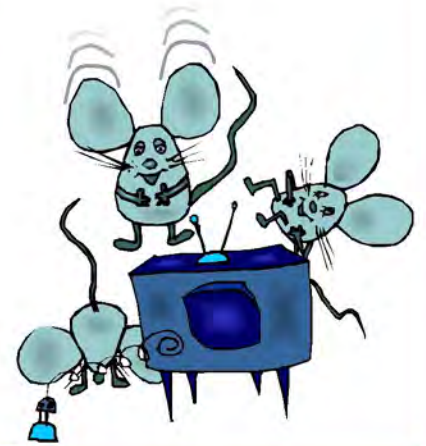

So began Phocus' journey to Hawaii to begin his new life as a part of the Hawaii Urban Search and Rescue Unit!

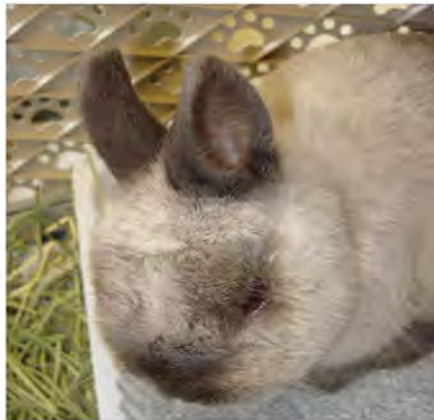

XYLITOL

The sugar alcohol xylitol used in products like toothpaste, and sugar-free baked goods may be safe for humans, but can pose a serious health threat for pets. Xylitol which can be found in chewable vitamins, throat lozenges, sprays, chewing gum, and mints can cause sudden drops in blood sugar (hypoglycemia) and well as liver failure in dogs. A pet that ingests xylitol can show signs of depression, loss of coordination and vomiting which can occur within minutes to days of ingestion.

WHY TAILS TEAM MEMBERS ARE SO EFFECTIVE

1. Choice - Teams are always given choices of places to visit, whether they want to participate in other outside activities, and in working with other team members on projects. Teams tend to have a higher level of dedication, commitment and ownership to that which they choose to do.
2. Decision - Teams are allowed their own action plans for implementation. While "choice" deals with what one may do, "decision" deals with how one may accomplish it. Teams take more pride in their action plans and have a higher level of buy in when they are in charge.
3. Creativity - Tails allows for alternative and diverging implementation plans to emerge, and make the work of the teams a safe environment.
4. Action Plan Feedback - Everyone tries to provide the other with feedback (positive or constructive) after an endeavor by specifically referencing the action steps that lead to the final outcome. This allows the team to have a better understanding of how to proceed in future situations and gain greater success and effectiveness.
5. Challenge - We make every effort to ensure that the work the team does is suitable to their expertise, knowledge and desire. Teams need to be challenged and there should never be complacency.
6. Competition - A little friendly competition is always great to keep the blood flowing. After all, we are all winners when we volunteer!



CAT VS. DOG

In a recent survey by Interlick of cat and dog owners, it was found that there is an actual difference...

*Dog owners are highly influenced by word-of-mouth recommendations from trusted sources and are least influenced by price.

*Cat owners pay attention to price and veterinarian recommendations.

*Dog owners spend 25 percent more at major pet retail outlets.

*Cat owners are more likely to shop neighborhood grocery stores.

*Dog owners are 50 percent more likely than cat owners to "spoil" their pets with branded or organic food.
